If a child begins to tell you about something that is happening to them you should:

- Tell them that you want to make sure they are safe.
- Tell them that you will have to pass on what they have told you to keep them safe.
- Listen carefully and try not to ask questions.

- A child seems regularly to be unfed or unkempt.
- A child seems to regularly have bruises or injuries.
- A child talks about violence at home.
- A child uses inappropriate sexual language or behaves in an inappropriate way for their age.
- A child tells you something that makes you concerned for their safety.
- A child uses scripted language or makes concerning internet searches.

This list is by no means everything there is! Please report anything that gives you cause for concern.
